

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2021 PRESIDENT'S REPORT by Allan Jankie

REPORTS 2021 by Liz James

USSR –Applications for immigration to enter Australia.

The Jewish Welfare Society was the prime migrant resettlement agency in the Jewish community and had been since the 1940's. The Society was instrumental in facilitating the settlement of more than 1,200 Soviet Jewish Arrivals in Australia under the special humanitarian program, this project began in 1988.

Helen Gardner, Rachel Markus and I are filing these immigration applications and on completion there will be a database of approximately 12,000 names which will give us details of the Australian sponsor, their family wishing to immigrate and an historical record of the rest of their family branches.

A few of the heart wrenching reasons for application are listed below.....

The family live in the high radiation zone, as a result of Chernobyl accident. Lack of normal food, the problem with political situation has created anti-Semitism.

'Receiving anti-Semitic phone calls, and the fear of possible assaults'

'Father is unemployed and they live off money sent to them from Australia and from selling their possessions Due to anti-Semitic incidents, the family is fearful of remaining in.......' Single mother, cannot feed her family.....'I feel humiliation. I have no present nor future. Help me for God's sake if war breaks out in'

Family want to come to Australia.... Son was hanged during his army service 'only because he was a Jew. He had been killed not during a war and not by enemies but by his mates who hated Jews and nobody, nobody had stopped them. Now my grandson is being mobilized into the Soviet army and we are terrified and scared to death that we could lose him in the same way, as the attitude towards Jewish people in the soviet army now is even worse than in 1977. Please help us, you are our only hope.'

TALK AT JEWISH MUSEUM OF AUSTRALIA

In May, I spoke to educators at the Jewish Museum of Australia where we discussed the feasibility of working together and sharing our resources for research projects

In conjunction with the Jewish Museum of Australia, we spoke to students at Mount Scopus, Sholem Aleichem and Yavneh about methods and websites to use on researching one's ancestors. I also spoke to the Yavneh parents at an evening session on the same topic.

Bialik and King David schools were visited onsite where we workshopped with the students and discussed how to access the various genealogical websites and databases.

Special thanks to the committee for their assistance and also to Tom Reisner, Esther Kahn and Judy Levron for assisting with the students from Yavneh.



LIBRARY - LIONEL SHARPE RESOURCE COLLECTION

Over 200 new titles have been added to the AJGS/AJHS collection. Many thanks to Lauren Joffe and her library team for maintaining the catalogue entries.

With my double connection to the AJHS and AJGS my part in the DoJR has been navigating our way to the location and listing of resources in both collections that have genealogical links. In that vein, I have organized a listing of all the Australian Jewish Historical Society – Vic. material which is housed in the State Library of Victoria to be included in the DoJR catalogue.

Over 500 book titles with genealogical content and their subject matter from the Lamm Library catalogue have also been listed for the DoJR catalogue. This includes titles from the Holocaust Centre, Kadimah, Australian Jewish Historical Society- Vic, Australian Jewish Genealogical Society – Vic and the St Kilda Hebrew Congregation collection.

DATABASE REPORT 2021 by Rodney Eisfelder

The society's marriage database continues to grow, although the rate of growth has slowed, partly due to the pandemic. Almost 3000 marriage records have been added since last year, and the project now covers over 60 congregations and/or rabbis, and just over 32,000 records. The information transcribed for each marriage has been expanded by a dedicated team.

DOCUMENTATION OF JEWISH RECORDS WORLD WIDE (DoJR)

An initiative of the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies. By Helen Gardner

In summary:

- Its aim is to capture and catalogue every source of Jewish genealogical information throughout the world.
- Its premise is that, notwithstanding the millions of Jewish genealogical records held by JewishGen, Family Search et al., there exists a vast quantity of material of Jewish genealogical interest which is uncatalogued or known to only a limited number of people.
- Australian data is a prime example of information most people overseas know little about. However, even within Australia there exists Jewish genealogical data which is little known.
- The catalogue (JCAT) will collect and store details of what information is available and where to find it, as well as what media it is stored on, its condition (good or fragile), and its general availability.
- The base data itself will not be held in the catalogue, only a reference to what data exists and where to find it.
- Some resources will be open for all to see, while others will require a searcher to contact the holder of the information and request particular data.



AJGS (Vic) took on providing information to DoJR as a project, with Helen Gardner (Team Leader), Liz James, and Bubbles Segall volunteering to work on the project. As first responders, the team has been partnering with Marlis Humphrey and the American team with four objectives:

- 1. To create simple and easily useable template: а The initial template for entering data was devised for the trial "proof of concept" research based on various levels of governmental data in Poland and Lithuania. It is far too complex and elaborate for entry by a JGS with non-governmental and not necessarily complete records sets. In the process of entering our data we are helping to establish easily understood definitions of the terms (eg who owns the data, who has custody of it; how to record if there is more than one custodial organisation); discover what information is generally not available (such as what geographical areas are covered by the data set – generally impossible to specify for data from countries like Australia, the US, etc. where European or other Jewry immigrated) and hence not useful to ask for, and other issues that arise as we endeavour to enter data. So our cooperation as the first responder for data entry is helping to simplify the form for eventual use by other JGSs.
- 2. To enter our known Victorian and some Australian data
- 3. To approach Jewish community organisations to compile information on what additional information of genealogical information they hold which could be included in the catalogue.
- 4. To investigate non-Jewish organisations such as University Alumni, Professional organisations, The Australian National Archives etc. to see what information they hold of Jewish genealogical interest.
