### Passing of Gary Mokotoff

Sadly, Gary Mokotoff has passed away. Gary was a central figure in the history of IAJGS (The International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies). From 1989 to 1995 he served as the founding president of IAJGS, and in 1998 he was the first recipient of the IAJGS Lifetime Achievement Award.

Gary's enthusiasm for Jewish genealogy coupled with his technical skills as a computer software pioneer led to the creation of many genealogical innovations such as JewishGen's Family Finder and the Daitch-Mokotoff Soundex system.

His vision and drive took him into the world of communications as both an author and as publisher of the journal *Avotaynu: The International Review of Jewish Genealogy*.

Gary also served in leadership roles for JewishGen, the Federation of Genealogical Societies (FGS) and the Association of Professional Genealogists (APG).

Gary opened the door to genealogy research for many in the Jewish community through organized trips to the FamilySearch Library and the Arolsen Archives. His passion for genealogy ignited that passion in others as well. Gary will be deeply missed.

### FamilySearch July 2025 Update | New Free Historical Records from 8 Countries

SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH—FamilySearch has expanded its free online collections in June 2025, with more than 30 million new records from 8 countries. Some of the exciting new additions include 16 million Italian birth, marriage, and death records (civil registrations, 1804 to 1943), 5 million Brazil cemetery records (1799 to 2024), and nearly 1 million records from the American Medical Association (AMA) of deceased physicians (1864 to 1968). FamilySearch continues to add millions of new records each week to its online collections from countries around the globe. Today, more than 20 billion historical records and images can be searched freely at [FamilySearch.org](https://www.familysearch.org).

### JewishGen's Holocaust Database: Holocaust Database Increases Access by More Than 1,750,000 Records

JewishGen is proud to announce its 2025 annual update summary for the Holocaust Database. The Holocaust Database can be found at <https://www.jewishgen.org/databases/Holocaust/>. The database includes information from a variety of records including, but not limited to; ghetto census reports, transport lists, forced labour lists, camp lists, victims' lists, survivor lists, post-war transport lists and displaced persons camp lists.

Over the last year, the Holocaust Database added access to more than 1,750,000 records from approximately 50 different data sets. This update brings the total number of Holocaust Database records to more than 6 million. A significant agreement with the Arolsen Archives

(<https://arolsen-archives.org/en/>) now gives JewishGen researchers the ability to search our centralized database and find records of interest in Arolsen’s “Red Line Card Inquiries” database and their “List of Austrian Holocaust Survivors Returned to Vienna”. Actual records and source documents are kept at the Arolsen Archives.

Thanks to Randy Schoenberg, JewishGen researchers can now locate records on Geni ([Geni.com](https://www.geni.com)) family trees that indicate individuals who were connected to Auschwitz and Theresienstadt.

JewishGen volunteers will complete the indexing of close to 100,000 records from The Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society (HIAS) French office records located at the YIVO Institute for Jewish Research (YIVO) (<https://www.yivo.org/>). These lists include passenger manifests from the late 1930’s through the post-war 1950’s, various refugees and survivor lists, victim lists, and displaced persons (DP) lists. It even includes a list of Jewish “Discharged Members of the French Foreign Legion in the Les Milles French Internment Camp 1940”. Although the majority of these records are currently online, continuing work on these records will take place through year-end.

Finally, an increasing number of individual researchers share their results with us. This includes information on specific towns, projects, discovered camp records and other Holocaust related material. We want to express our appreciation to our data donors. And a very big thank you to all of our JewishGen data-entry volunteers who work tirelessly to transcribe records from source documents of varying quality to create the searchable databases that all JewishGen researchers can benefit from.

### July 20<sup>th</sup> 2025: Translating, Transcribing and Summarizing Documents using AI

### August 17<sup>th</sup> 2025: Tombstones-The Stories They Tell

Zvika Oren from Israel, is the son of Holocaust survivors from Hungary. His parents arrived in Israel after the war and kept silent about their wartime experiences, leaving Zvika and his siblings with little knowledge of their roots.

Using advancing digital tools, Zvika uncovered his genealogy going back six generations in Hungary.

With more than thirty years as a high-tech professional—including over two decades at a global Israeli hi-tech company—Zvika delivered a zoom presentation for members on “Tombstones-The Stories They Tell.”
